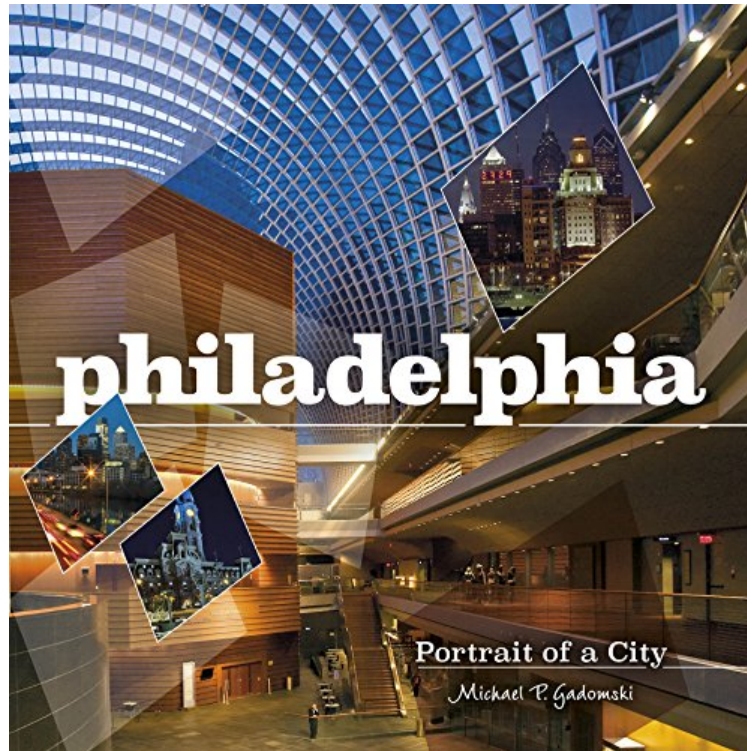

Take an armchair tour of the Liberty Bell, Independence Hall, and the

Betsy Ross House; head over to University of Pennsylvania's Morris Arboretum; then venture out to nearby Valley Forge Park. Through creative vantage points, absorb Philly's local color as you stroll around Old City and the 18th-century homes of Society Hill; you might even sneak a peek at the New Year's Day Mummers. From the Schuylkill to the Delaware, along the old cobblestones and among the towering monuments, Philadelphia welcomes you with open arms.
