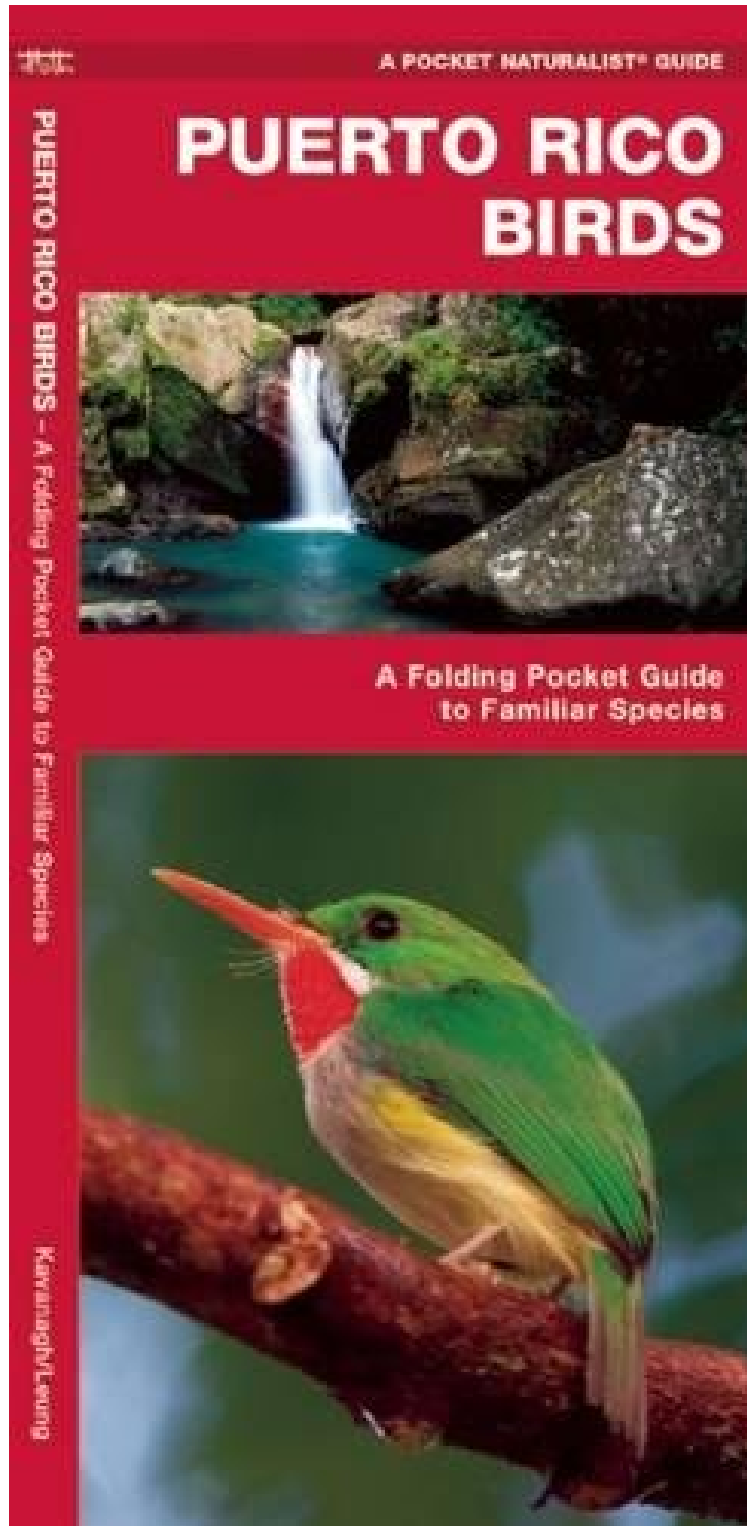

By DavidThis is an attempt at a quick reference waterproof pamphlet to some common birds of Puerto Rico, most of the endemics and some regional specialties. It also includes a location map with most of the good birding areas on it.I am an experienced birder and just wanted a quick reference guide to the endemic and regional specialties. There are some big negatives: 1) the plates really are quite poor and tiny; 2) it's missing three endemics - elfin woods warbler, yellow-shouldered blackbird and puerto-rican spindalis; 3) it does include stripe-headed tanager but the puerto-rican spindalis was split from this species in 1997; 4) it's missing a lot of regional specialties; 5) it includes a number of introduced species possibly as they are common but most experienced birders know what these are as they are common in many places worldwide. It would have been better to have taken out birds like house sparrow, java sparrow and red avadavat and at least complete the endemics however tiny the plates. I don't recommend this for beginners who would need a far more comprehensive guide to be able to accurately identify most species and it's practically useless for expert birders who want a quick reference guide to the endemics. The only thing of any value IMO is the bird viewing areas map on the back which is why I have given it 2 not 1 stars
