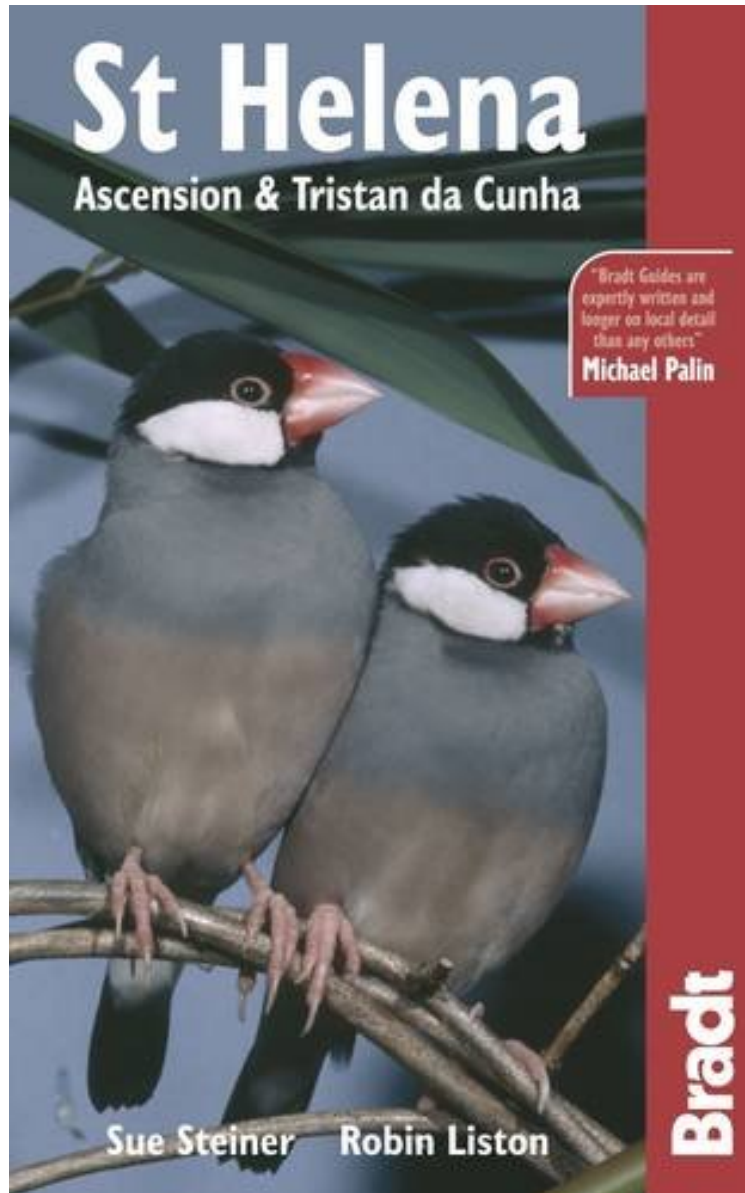

This book is about three small English speaking islands: St. Helena, Ascension and Tristan da Cunha. These small islands were discovered by the Portugueses and conquered easily by Englishes many decades later. There's many great things in this book: 1- This book is easy to understand. 2- This book shows the many problems about tourism in these islands. As an example, there's no link from Brazil, to these islands (see page 60). 3- There's good maps of these islands. 4- This book is short, concise and correct. 5- There's good maps of these three islands and with color (see pages two and three). 6- All main small cities of these islands have maps easily to see and understand. 7- The couple of authors really know about these islands. Even so, I decided not to give five stars for this book, because of two problems: 1- There's just five pages with photos in this book. I wanted far more photos. 2- About the Nightingale Islands, Gough Island and Inaccessible Island hadn't a map about where they are near to Tristan da Cunha. There's black white maps, but not about how near these islands are from Tristan da Cunha.

A guidebook for true explorers, the south Atlantic islands of St Helena, Ascension and Tristan da Cunha are isolated and therefore a fascinating destination for travellers who enjoy a completely different vacation. Their remote location has led to a host of endemic plant species and large seabird colonies, meaning the islands appeal to botanists and birdwatchers the world over.
